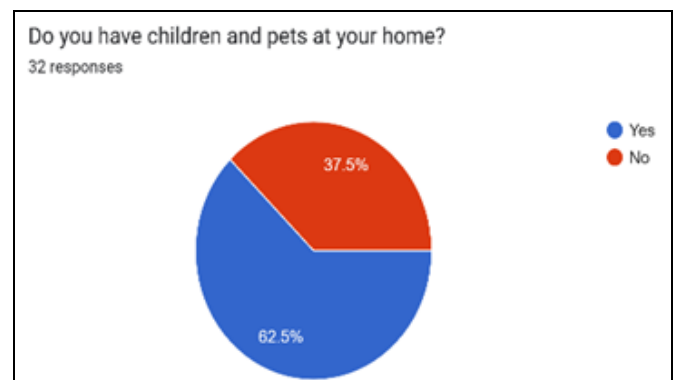


Fig 1: Do respondents have children & pets

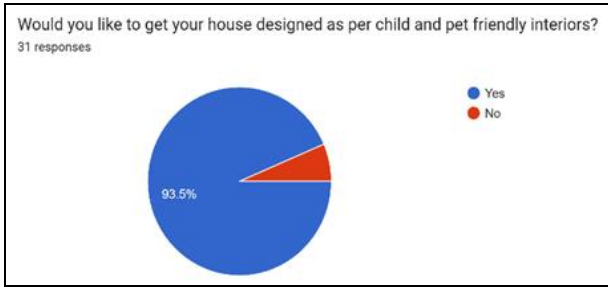


Fig 2: Designed as children & pet friendly

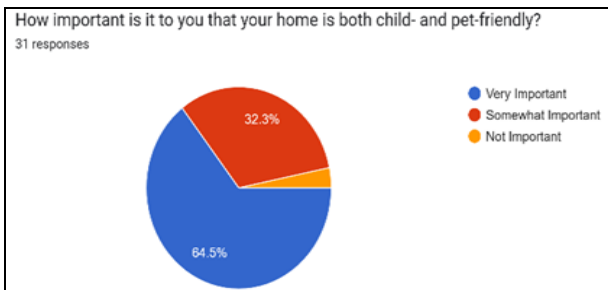


Fig 3: Importance of friendliness

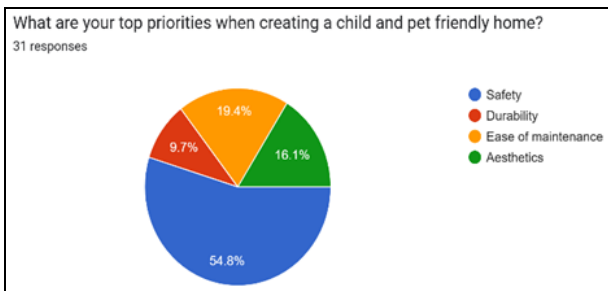


Fig 4: Top priorities

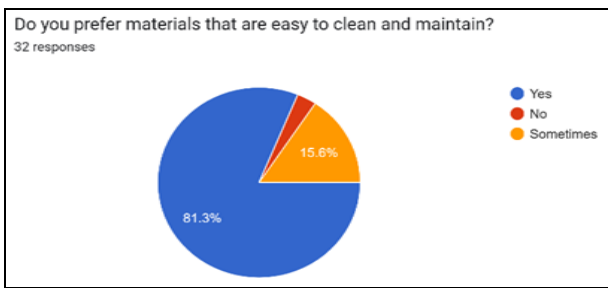


Fig 5: Easy to clean materials

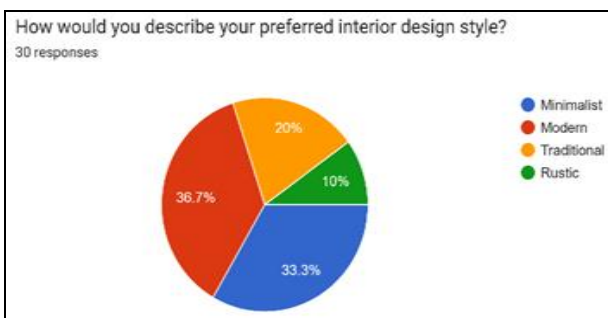


Fig 6: Describe preferred interior design style

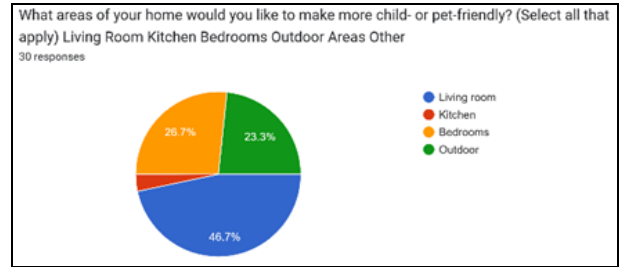


Fig 7: Which area incorporates more of them

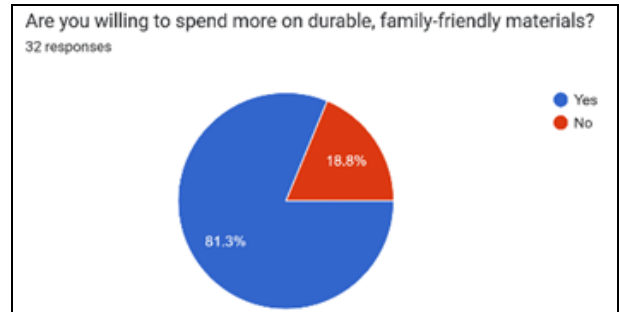


Fig 8: Willingness to spend more

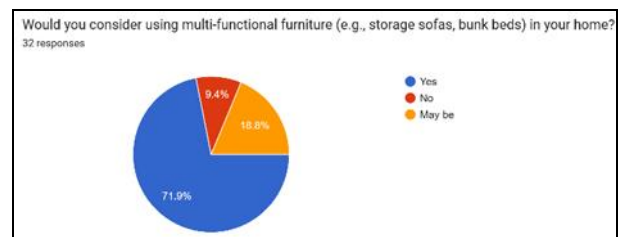


Fig 9: Multi-functional furniture

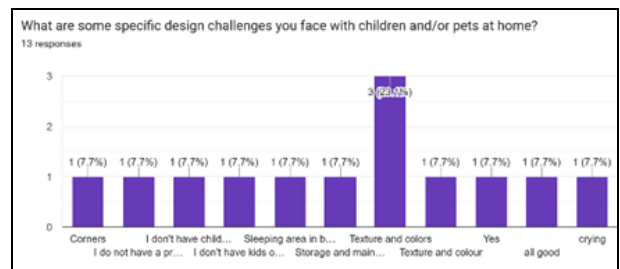


Fig 10: Specific design challenges faced
