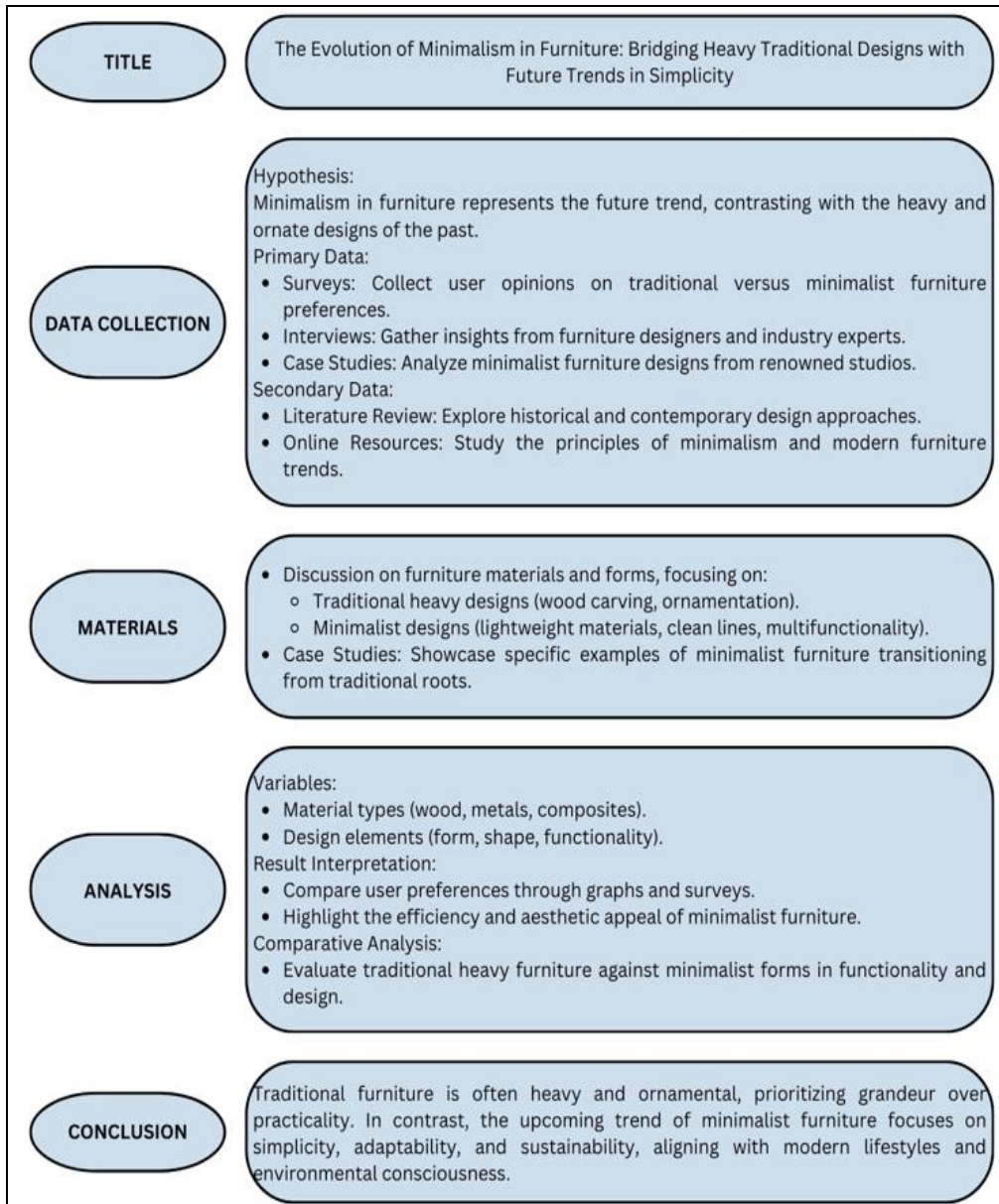

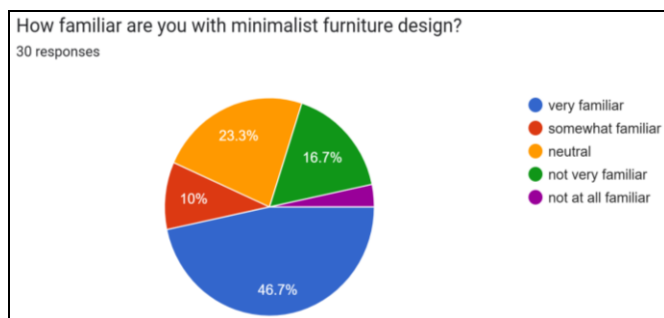


Fig 16: Survey_1

Most respondents are "very familiar," while familiarity decreases across the other categories, showing varied awareness levels.

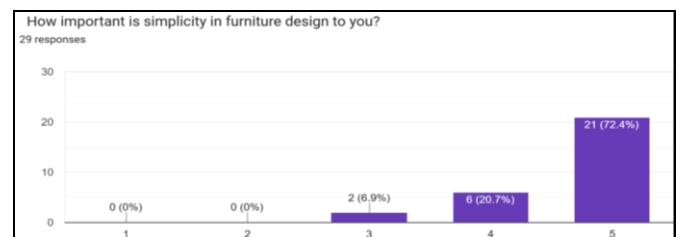


Fig 17: Survey_2

The trend indicates a positive perception of simplicity, with most respondents assigning higher importance to it.

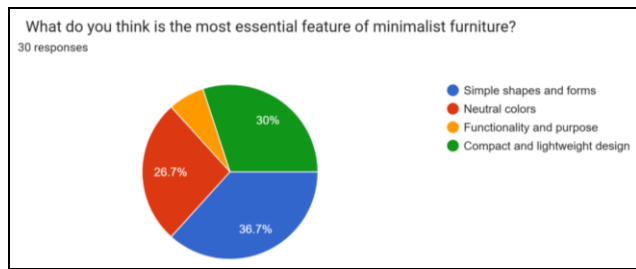


Fig 18: Survey_3

Simple shapes are most valued, followed by compact design.

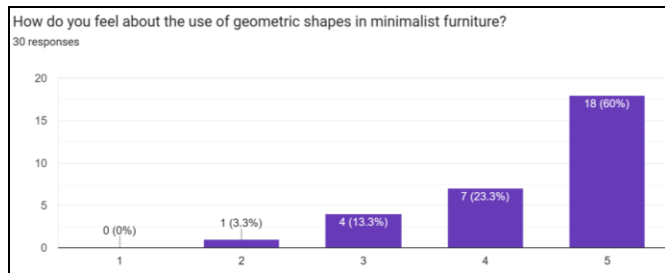


Fig 19: Survey_4

Clean lines and structured forms are most valued, reflecting the importance of simplicity in minimalist design.

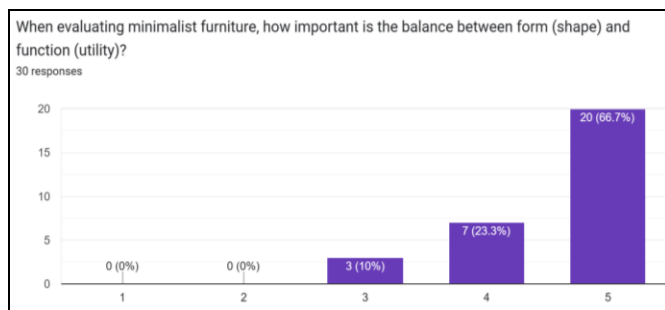


Fig 20: Survey_5

Respondents highly value designs that integrate aesthetic simplicity with practical functionality, reinforcing the core principle of minimalism.

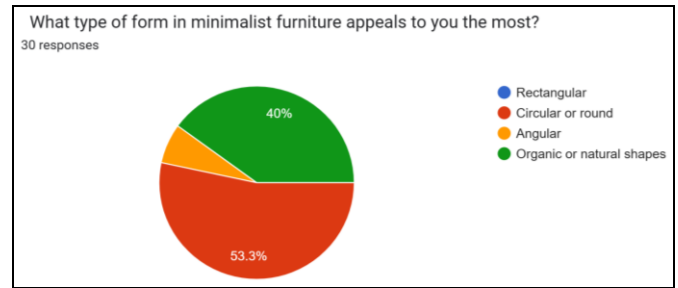


Fig 21: Survey_6

Respondents highly value designs that integrate aesthetic simplicity with practical functionality, reinforcing the core principle of minimalism.

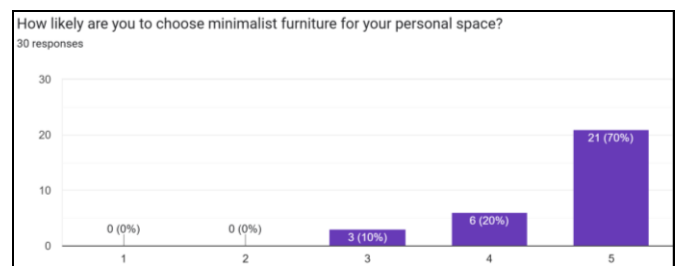


Fig 22: Survey_7

The upward trend suggests that a majority of respondents are inclined toward selecting minimalist furniture for their personal spaces.

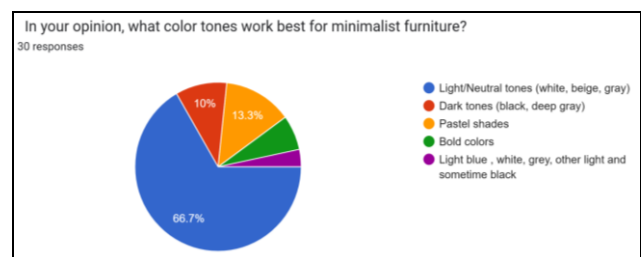


Fig 23: Survey_8

Preferences for other color tones are significantly lower but exhibit some variation.

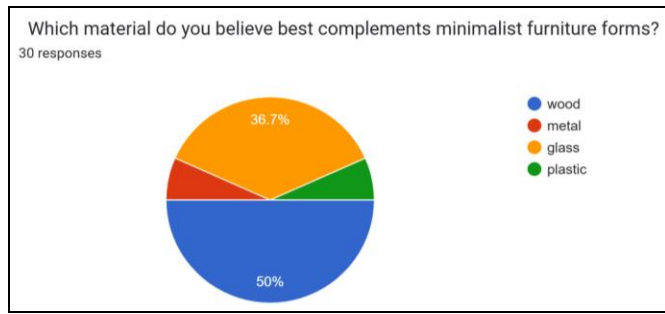


Fig 24: Survey_9

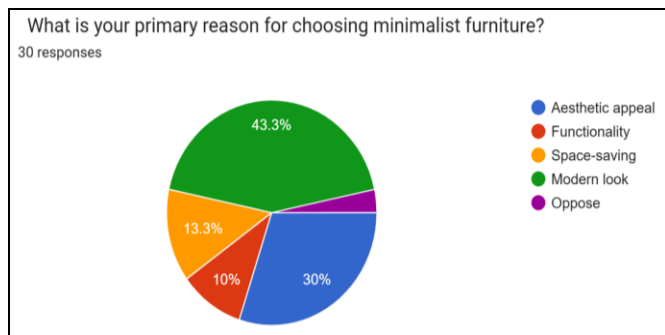


Fig 25: Survey_10

"Modern look" is the most preferred, while "Oppose" has the least support. Other reasons show moderate variation.

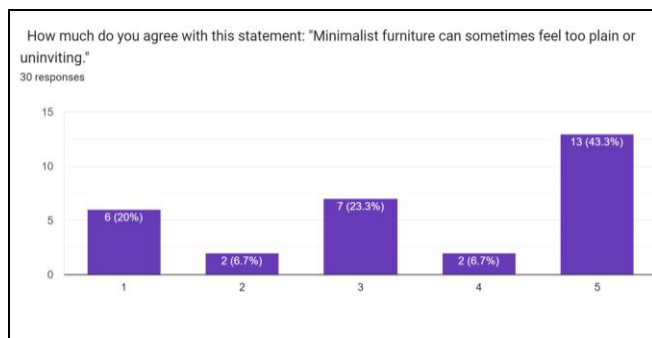


Fig 26: Survey_11

Agreement increases consistently, with a peak at 5, indicating that most respondents feel minimalist furniture can appear plain or uninviting.

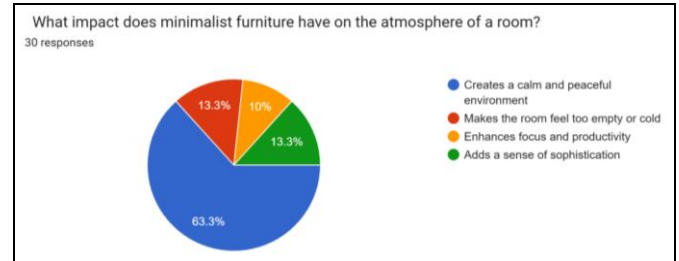


Fig 27: Survey_12
